Disputed & misleading: Twitter censors Trump's post

Twitter on Wednesday placed a "disputed" label on a tweet from President Donald Trump in which he accused the rival Biden campaign of trying to "steal" the tightly-contested 2020 presidential elections.

In his first reaction to the election results, Trump tweeted, "We are up BIG, but they are trying to STEAL the Election. We will never let them do it. Votes cannot be cast after the Polls are closed!" The tweet was placed behind a warning on the president's account that the content shared is "disputed and might be misleading about an election or other civic process."

Facebook also flagged the post of president Trump. "Final results may be different from initial vote counts, as ballots counting will continue for days and weeks," Facebook said, quoting Bipartisan Policy Center.

The social media giant also flagged the second post by Trump in which he claimed that he is winning big and will soon make a statement.

"I will be making a statement tonight. A big WIN!" he said.

Flagging the post, Facebook said, "the winner of the 2000 US Presiden-

tial Election has not been projected." Earlier, Twitter pinned a warning on a Trump campaign tweet declaring victory in the battleground state of South Carolina, saying it was premature and not confirmed by official sources.

A message under the tweet, in which the campaign trumpeted that Trump had won the Southern state, said "official sources may not have called the race when this was Tweeted," the Politico reported.

The action came even as multiple news outlets - including The New York Times, The Washington Post, CNN and POLITICO - have similarly projected that President Trump will win the state, the report said.

The tweet, said the social media giant, violates a rule rolled out for this election that requires such tweets to be backed by calls from at least two of seven specified news organisations.

Twitter, though, left alone a similar

Trump campaign tweet declaring victory in Florida because, the company said, it included a nod to one of Twitter's seven approved race callers.

The US' biggest social media companies have in recent days said that so-called premature declarations of victory were one of their primary concerns headed into this fraught Election Day, especially on a night expected to be full of close contests across the country.

A final verdict on who wins the presidency could take days or weeks depending on how the vote-counting, recounts and assorted court battles play out.

During the election campaign, Trump had accused the big tech companies of taking sides of Biden. He had alleged that the big tech companies do not want him to win the presidential elections.

When reports last came in, Trump had 174 electoral college votes, trailing behind 213 of his Democratic rival Joe Biden.

Trump was projected to win two major battle ground States, Florida and Ohio. He was leading in several other battle ground States of North Carolina, Georgia, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Nevada. Biden was leading in Arizona and Minnesota.

Calm Joe on track of victory

Democrat presidential nominee Joe Biden has asked his supporters to "keep the faith" and expressed confidence that he's on track to "win this election" as all eyes are on the outcome in Mid-western battleground states.

"We knew this was going to go long," 77-year-old Biden told a crowd in his hometown of Delaware.

"Keep the faith guys. We are going to win this," he said. "We believe we are on track to win this election." Biden has maintained his lead mid-way through the counting of votes, as Trump appeared to be fast catching up. As per Fox News, Biden has 237 of the 538 electoral college seats, while Trump has 210. On the other hand, CNN has projected 215 electoral college votes to Biden and 136 to Trump.

Congress gets first gay black man

Democrat Party's Ritchie Torres has made history by becoming the first openly gay Black man elected to the US Congress.

Torres, 32, a New York City Council Member, won the election from New York's 15th Congressional District, defeating Republican Patrick Delices to become the next representative, New York Daily News reported.

"Tonight, a new era begins for the South Bronx," Torres said in a statement. "It is the honour of a lifetime to represent a borough filled with essential workers who have risked their lives so that New York City could live."

"The Bronx is essential, and the vibrant, loving and talented people who live here have shown time and again their power, for-

tune and perseverance. The Bronx is the heartbeat of New York City," he said.

Torres, who identified himself as an Afro-Latino, has served in the City Council since 2013.

He defeated nearly a dozen other Democrats in the June primary after Republican Jose Serrano announced his retirement earlier this year.

Torres is expected to be joined by another Black gay man, Mondaire Jones, in the US House of Representatives as results were pending in the race to replace retiring Republican Nita Lowey from Westchester county.

The seat is expected to go to 33-year-old Jones, a Harvard Law School graduate and former Westchester County attorney, who was leading Republican Maureen McArdle Schulman as of midnight, the report said.



Meet first trans state senator of US history

Democrat Sarah McBride has won a state Senate race in Delaware, and would become the first openly transgender state senator in the country when sworn in.

McBride defeated Republican Steve Washington to win the seat that became open following the retirement of the longest-serving legis-

lator in Delaware history. She won in a heavily Democratic district stretching from northern Wilmington to the Pennsylvania border, and joins several other transgender legislators around the country but will be the first transgender state senator. "I think tonight's results demonstrate what I've known my entire life, which is that the residents of this district are fair-minded, and they're looking at candidates' ideas and not their identity," McBride said Tuesday night. "It is my hope that a young LGBTQ kid here in Delaware or really anywhere in this country can look at the results and know that our democracy is big enough for them, too."



Music buries the rage

Supporters of Trump and Biden challenge each other to a sing-off

For a brief and unexpected moment, there was harmony. Melody, too. A group of Donald Trump supporters and backers of Joe Biden started shouting at each other through bullhorns Tuesday night near a voting precinct in the Detroit suburb of Warren, and as tensions escalated, police were called in to keep the two sides separated.

That was when Matthew Woods, a 59-year-old Trump supporter and traveling musician from Upland, California, who was dressed as a Revolutionary War soldier, challenged the Biden side to a sing-off. "We sang 'My Country, 'Tis of Thee,' 'God Bless America,'" Woods said of his group of about 20 people. At first, the 30 or so Biden supporters "refused to sing, though one sang 'Kumbaya.' I walked over and stood beside them." The opposing groups - holding signs for their candidates - soon started singing together and even posed for photos, according to Woods. "We shook hands, hugged each other and apologized for saying bad words to one another," Wood said. "Let's forget about politics. Let's hug each other and be friends." Michigan Secretary of State Jocelyn tweeted details of the exchange, calling it a "hopeful story for today." "What began as a tense exchange in Ma-gom County involving supporters of both presidential candidates shouting at each other through bullhorns took an unexpected turn as Trump & Biden supporters together began singing 'God Bless America' as a united group," she tweeted.

Hey Kanye, see you again in four years

Kanye West has conceded defeat in the US presidential election after getting a little more than 57,000 votes on Tuesday, though he hinted that he'll mount another run for the White House in four years, according to Daily Mail report.

The rapper known as Yeezy posted a picture of himself on Twitter in front of an electoral map saying 'WELP KANYE 2024.'

Earlier on Tuesday, West voted for himself as the next US president after a long-shot campaign marked by erratic statements and speculation that he might siphon some

black votes from Democrat Joe Biden, reports the Daily Mail.

The rapper, who made a late entry into the presidential race in July, tweeted a string of videos on election day, showing himself filling in his ballot at a polling place in Park County, Wyoming, where he owns a ranch.

Though West has no chance of taking the White House, Democrats fear West could siphon key votes from black voters away from Joe Biden, helping Trump to a win.

According to Daily Mail, Some have questioned whether West is working in collusion with Trump to hurt Biden's campaign, given his

previous public support for the Republican and his close friendship with Trump's senior adviser and son-in-law Jared Kushner.

West had first touted plans to run for president back in 2015. He previously said he was 'walking for president' - referring to his aim to run again in 2024.

850K kids COVID positive in US

WASHINGTON: Over 850,000 children in the US have tested positive for the novel coronavirus since the onset of the pandemic in the now worst-hit country, according to a new report of the American Academy of Pediatrics and the Children's Hospital Association.

A total of 61,447 new child cases were reported last week from October 22 to 29, which is the highest since the pandemic began. Xinhua news agency quoted the report as saying on Tuesday. In October, nearly 200,000 new child Covid-19 cases were reported in the coun-

try. Altogether 853,635 child cases have been reported in the US so far, and children represented 11.1 per cent of all those infected, said the report. The overall rate was 1,134 cases per 100,000 children in the population, according to the report.

'In God We Trust' on Mississippi's new flag

Mississippi will fly a new state flag with a magnolia and the phrase "In God We Trust", with voters approving the design on Tuesday. It replaces a Confederate-themed flag state lawmakers retired months ago as part of the national reckoning over racial injustice.

The magnolia flag was the only design on the general election ballot, and voters were asked to say yes or no. A majority said yes.

Mississippi has been without a flag since late June, when legislators surrendered the last state banner in the US, that included the Confederate battle emblem - a red field topped by a blue X with 13 white



stars. The rebel flag has been used by Ku Klux Klan groups and is widely condemned as racist.

The new Mississippi flag has the state flower on a dark blue background with red bars on either end. The magnolia is encircled by stars representing Mississippi as the 20th state. The flag also has a single star made of diamond shapes representing the Native American people who lived on the land before others arrived.

"We were getting ready for a big celebration," Trump said. "We were winning everything and all of the sudden it was just called off." He added, "We will win this and as far as I'm concerned we already have won it."
